"10th Anniversary of School Establishment" Ceremony Held at Vocational School for Auto Mechanics in the Philippines

Since November 2008, Isuzu has conducted an educational program focused on disadvantaged children at a vocational school for auto mechanics under the Philippine Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA*) in Tacloban City on the island of Leyte, the Philippines.

The reunion included events to which the local residents were invited and charity events for underprivileged children, all filled with the spirit of gratitude, making it an important ceremony with the aim of creating harmony with the local community.

Also, after the reunion, an entrance ceremony for 36 new students in the 17th class and a graduation ceremony for 17 students from the 14th class were held under the proud observation of many of their seniors.
